Rules And Regulations For The 74th Annual Okawville Agricultural Products Fair September 16, 17, 18, 2022

1 – The management of the Okawville Agricultural Products Fair Association reserves to its Executive Committee the final and absolute right to interpret these Rules and Regulations and settle all matters in question and differences that may arise in connection with holding, managing or promoting the Fair. The Superintendent of each department will have charge of the department. But the Executive Committee of this Association is hereby vested with full authority to construe all Rules and Regulations of this Association. The Executive Committee is composed of the President, the Secretary and the Treasurer.

2 - The Superintendents of each Department have the right to disqualify any exhibit that does not follow the rules of their department.

3 – The Judges’ decision will be final, unless complainant can show fraud or other irregularity in placing awards. Such complaint as an incompetent judge will not be considered by the management.

4 – A protest on award must be made in writing within five days after closing day of the Fair, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting the award, and a deposit of \$25.00 accompanying the protest. In the event of the protest being sustained, the \$25.00 will be returned to the complainant. If the protest is not sustained, the \$25.00 will be forfeited to the Association.

5 – All entries of corn exhibited must be from the current year’s crop of this product and exhibits of this product from a previous year’s crop will not be accepted by the judges.

6 – All entries must be produced or made by the entrant or his/her family. Purchased entries will not be accepted.

7 – The Fair Association will use every reasonable precaution to safeguard the public, exhibitors, employees, and exhibits, but positively will not be liable for loss, theft, damage, or injury to person or articles.

Antique Tractor Pull To Be Held September 17th

An antique tractor pull will be held on Saturday, September 17th at 2:00 p.m. at the Okawville Fair.

Tractors of 1945 vintage and older will be permitted to pull. Fluid in tires will be allowed, however, no add-on weight may be permitted. No tractor may be entered in more than one class. Contestants must furnish their own clevis. Maximum drawbar height is to be 18 inches, maximum tire width is 14 inches, first four classes. No shaved tires.

Tractors should be on the grounds by 1:00 P.M.. There will be six classes - one plow, light two plow, two plow, light three plow, three plow, and four plow.

The committee's decision in placing tractors in the proper class will be final. Trophies will be given in each class.

At the conclusion of the tractor pull, a slow race will be held. In a slow race, the contestant is not allowed to touch the clutch once the race is started. The last tractor to cross the finish line is the winner.

We ask all owners of antique tractors to come and bring their tractors and join in the fun. Make a point to be in Okawville on Saturday, September 18th at 2:00 p.m. and see these tractors of yesteryear in action. Bleachers will be provided for the comfort of the spectators.
